Council met June 12, 2024, to hear reports and conduct business.

Council approved the recommendation from the Worship and Music committee to move Sunday morning worship to the Social Hall during July and August in order to provide a cooler location during the hotter months. The service will still be videotaped for airing on Breezeline.


Beginning with the June healing service, the Healing portion will be separate from Communion. There will be station at the end of the aisle for the healing portion, and communion will be as usual.

Vicar Christy will be in Gettysburg the week of June 16 – 21 for her last graded class. She will serve as Chaplain at Camp Sequanota from Sunday June 23 after worship, through Friday June 28.

Treasurer Barry Critchfield reported that income and expenses continue to move in the right direction and was pleased to report the church made its last payment to Raimondo for the repairs to the stonework done some time ago.

The Property committee has ordered new thermostats for the kitchen ovens, which were needed for proper temperature.

Council will take a summer break in July and their next regular meeting will be August 14, 2024 at 7:00 pm.

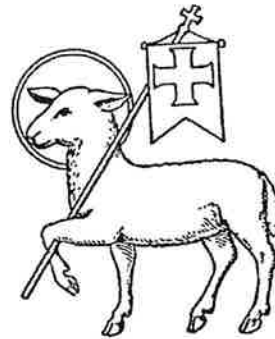

### Of the Land and Seasons **"O Lamb of God"**



Many have told me how they find the music in Of the Land and Seasons refreshing and enjoyable to sing. In the June VSJ I wrote about the tune *Shady Grove* used in the "Sanctus – Holy, Holy,

Holy."

One of the melodies I find especially beautiful is found in "O Lamb of God." The tune is called *The Suffolk Miracle* or sometimes *The Holland Handkerchief*. First found in print in 1678 and 1680 in England, variations of the melody can be heard in England, Ireland, North America, and even Iceland. The original ballad tells of a beautiful woman courted by man of low standing. The woman's father disapproves and sends the woman away only to be visited by the ghost of the suitor. The tale is one of romance and mystery.

*The Suffolk Miracle*, as a melody, fits the "Lamb of God" poetry so well. Unusual features of the tune include its nine/eight meter, gentle syncopations, and its mixolydian mode – that's the odd "wrong note" – a lowered seventh – in the last line. The tune retains its mystery as we proclaim the mystery of Christ serving as the sacrifice for all as the Lamb of God.

**Andrea Blough to open  
July recital series**



**Andrea Blough** will sing a popular aria from a Puccini opera when she returns to the Tuesday Noon Recital Series **July 9**. "O mio babbino caro" (O my dear papa) is a widely performed aria from a lesser-known

opera, "Gianni Schiccho."

Blough's program covers 300 years of music, from early Italian art songs to pieces by Franz Schubert and Fernando Obradors.

She says she is happy to support the recital series. "I enjoy connecting with a receptive audience in such a beautiful space," she said.

Her accompanist is *Caleb Bean*, a pre-med student at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, who teaches and plays piano in a jazz ensemble and plays a trumpet in the concert band.

Each of four recitals in July will be followed by a light lunch, at no charge, because the series has been pre-paid by donations.

Other upcoming recitals:

**July 16. Johnstown Brassworks.** The quintet comprises area educators who enjoy playing music. They have performed together since 2014 at recitals, weddings and church services.

**July 23. Aaron Sproul,** organ. The associate director of music at St. Michael the Archangel Parish in Pittsburgh has performed throughout the city, including Heinz Chapel. He is the co-director of the Organ Artists Series of Pittsburgh, which presents recitals throughout the Pittsburgh region.

**July 30. Take Two, Russ and Donna Miller.** The Maryland couple have been performing since they were teenagers. At age 14 he was the featured trumpet soloist with the Johnstown Youth Symphony. She once played drums for the country recording artist Joe Maphis. The Millers sing and play various instruments. They involve the audience in their performance.

It is not too early to begin thinking about our annual ***God's Work Our Hands Sunday.***

This day of service is usually held on the first or second Sunday of September. Watch for the date we will celebrate here at First.

In the meantime, we know that one of the service activities we will participate in is the creating of LWR School Kits. This has become a favorite annual service ministry. We must admit that we started planning a bit late last year and found that so many of the supplies that are needed were sold out. **SO** this year here is the shopping list for the school supplies. And I can tell you the supplies are already out in the stores and when I shopped this week, one store was already out of notebooks and they were waiting for the next shipment!

Education is one of the strongest tools a community has for breaking the cycle of poverty. Ensuring that girls attend school, especially in places where their access is deprioritized, has even stronger results. School kits contain essential supplies to help children – and in some cases, adults - continue learning in the face of serious obstacles. That learning leads to a better life for them, their families and their communities.

I was privileged to attend the 2014 Synod Assembly in Altoona this past month. It was certainly more engaging than the online assembly I ‘attended’ in 2021 via Zoom. I encourage anyone who is interested in learning more about the activities of the Synod to attend one in the future.

The morning session included reports from Bishop Paula Lebo, Pastor Kevin Schock, Treasurer Paula Nihoff, Vice President Ann Ferry, Secretary David Finney, and Director for Evangelical Mission, Sue Ellen Spotts.

Elections for Synod Council and Committee members also took place in the morning, with second ballot voting in the afternoon if necessary. Those elected to Synod Council are Rev. Tyler Graham, Rev. Nancy Hoover, Rev. Marty Jo Irvin-Stellabotte, and Peggy Thatcher. Timothy Albright was elected to the Consultation Committee. The Rev. Rebecca Horn was elected as Synod Secretary, replacing David Finney who is retiring. Vicar Christy Harford was elected to the Discipline Committee. Those elected to attend the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly are Rev. Tyler Graham, Rev. Marty Jo Irvin-Stellabotte, Vicar Christy Harford, Benjamin Hoffman and Jacob Koch.

The afternoon session was filled with many informative and inspiring reports from a variety of organizations, from Camp Sequanota to the United Lutheran Seminary.

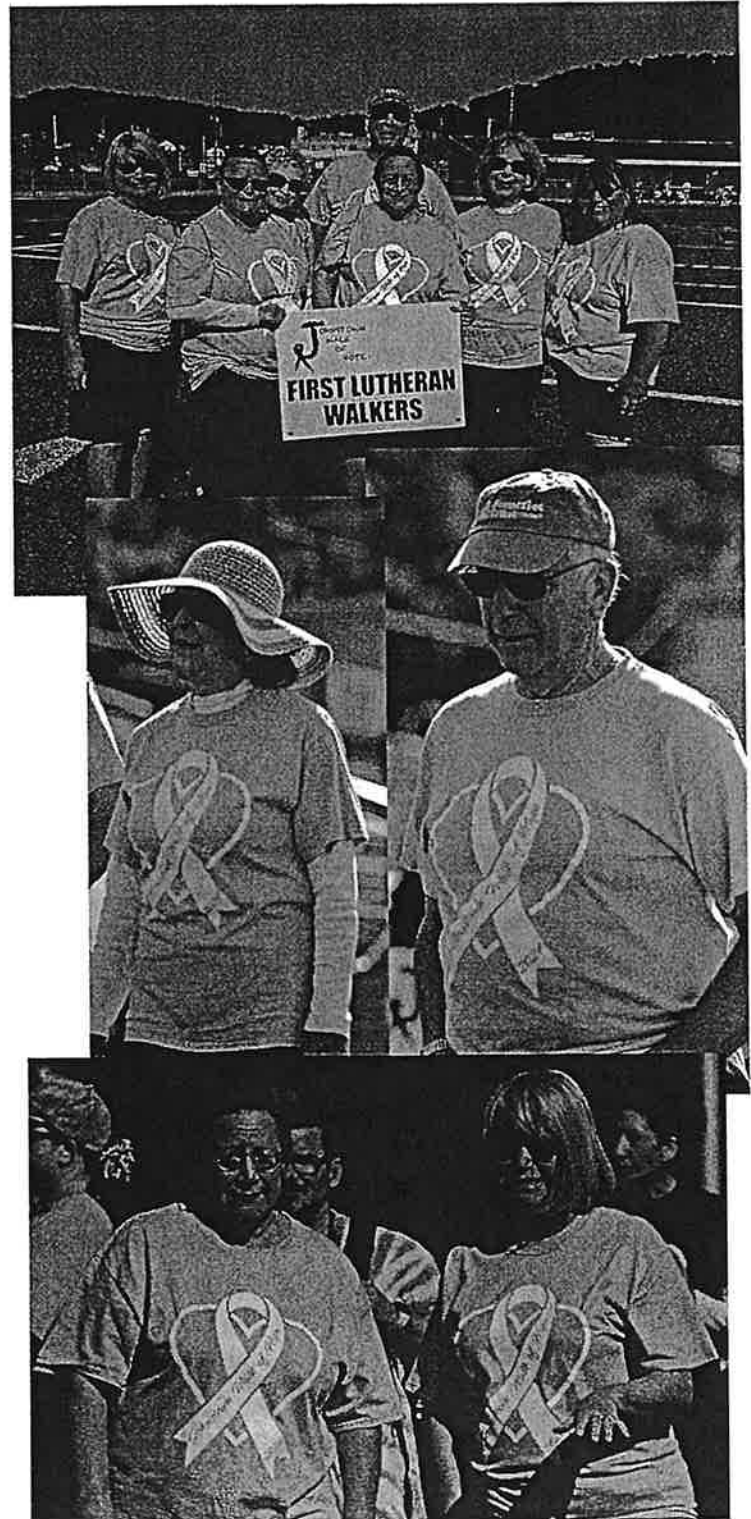

### Seeing God in the Poor

Today, our ways of giving to the poor involve less direct interaction with the people who are poor. Almsgiving, on the other hand, was specifically a way for the donor to interact with the recipient. In fact, the interaction was the primary focus of almsgiving. Jews in Jesus' time understood that God was present, or incarnate, among the poor. To interact with the poor was to interact with God. The importance of this act was so great that, by Jesus' time, many Jewish texts considered almsgiving to be of equal or greater value than sacrifices made in the temple.

Through alms, individual Jews interacted with those who were poor and thereby interacted with God. Observant Jews would have seen beggars as an opportunity to carry out an important ritual: giving alms.

For Jesus, there was something important and unique about interacting with those who receive our gifts. We should take note of this. If our giving does not include interactions with those who are poor, we may be missing something that was vital to Jesus' understanding of how people interact with God.
